# What Is Single IRB Review?



Single IRB review refers to the use of one IRB to review and approve all or most sites participating in a multisite research study, rather than each site obtaining approval for their activities from a different IRB.



Other terms for a single IRB include:

Central IRB Reviewing IRB

# **Brief History of Single IRB Review**

#### Prior to 2018

Using one IRB to oversee multisite (aka cooperative) research occurred on a limited basis

The FDA has yet
to issue a
requirement to
use a single IRB,
but does not
oppose the use of
a single IRB for
multisite
research.



## January 25, 2018

Most multisite research supported by the National Institutes of Health (NIH) requires single IRB review



## January 20, 2020

Most multisite research subject to the Common Rule requires single IRB review

## **NIH Single IRB Policy**

Required funding applications to include a single IRB plan for most multisite research - now single IRB identified at JIT

Applies to both biomedical and social behavioral research that meets the definition of a clinical trial

Now permits the use of federal funding to pay for certain IRB costs, which can affect research budgets

The policy is generally similar to the single IRB requirement within the Common Rule

## Common Rule Cooperative Research Requirement

- Requires single IRB for most non-exempt human subjects research that involves more than one institution
- Applies to research
  - Conducted in the US
  - Approved by an IRB on or after January 20, 2020
- Does not apply when
  - More than a single IRB required by law

or

- A Federal department or agency conducting or supporting the research determines and documents that the use of a single IRB is not appropriate for the specific context
- Extends the NIH policy that went into effect in 2018

## **Documenting Single IRB Agreements**

To use a single IRB for a multisite research study, institutions must document reliance agreements, including which institution will serve as the Reviewing IRB, which will cede IRB review, and the responsibilities of each institution.
